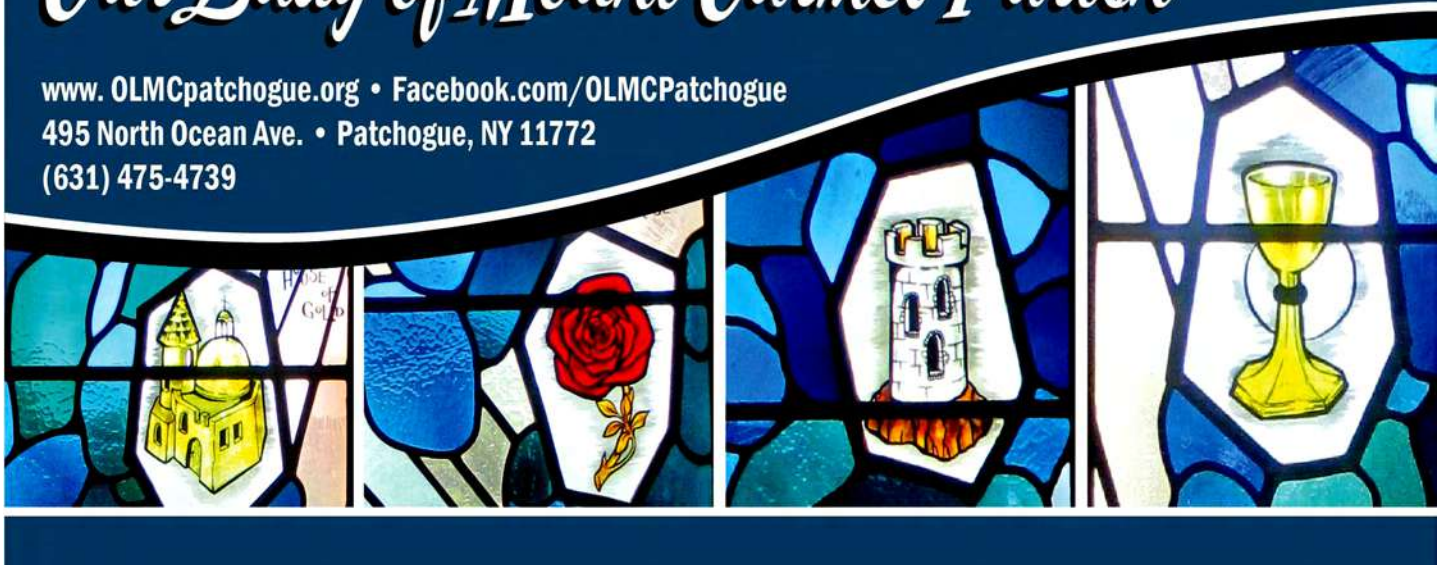

### DEVOTED TO PRAYER

Today, as we await Pentecost, we come to the end of the baptismal homily from Peter that we have heard over the past few weeks. This homily was written by a realist who knew the joy and the glory of a Resurrection faith, but also knew that the strength of that faith would be put to the test and tried in suffering. Earlier this year we heard Jesus preach, "Blessed are you when they insult you . . . because of me" (Matthew 5:11) and this is echoed today by Peter. These words are also formed in the image of Christ who prays to the Father in heaven today, a prayer that is placed in John's Gospel right before Jesus endures his suffering and death. Our awaiting the Spirit, awaiting our mission for Christ means that we are, most likely, awaiting some sort of trial and suffering. We don't endure the same degree of persecution that Peter and John knew, but each of us has our faith put to the test eventually. And it is for this reason that we, like Jesus and like those faithful followers gathered in the upper room, devote ourselves to prayer.

### DEDICADOS A LA ORACIÓN

Hoy, mientras esperamos Pentecostés, llegamos al final de la homilía bautismal de Pedro que hemos estado escuchando en las últimas semanas. Esta homilía fue escrita por un realista que conoció el gozo y la gloria de una fe de resurrección, pero que también supo que el temple de esa fe sería probado en el sufrimiento. Varios domingos atrás oímos a Jesús predicar: "Dichosos cuando los injurien. . . por causa mía" (Mateo 5:11) y eso encuentra eco hoy en Pedro. Estas palabras se forman en la imagen de Cristo que reza al Padre del Cielo hoy, una oración colocada en el Evangelio de Juan justo antes de que Jesús pasara por su sufrimiento y muerte. Esperar al Espíritu, esperar nuestra misión por Cristo significa que, probablemente, aguardamos algún tipo de prueba y sufrimiento. No soportamos el mismo grado de persecución que Pedro y Juan pasaron, pero la fe de cada uno de nosotros eventualmente será probada. Y es por esta razón que nosotros, al igual que Jesús y aquellos fieles discípulos que se reunieron en la habitación superior, nos dedicamos a la oración.

## **Seventh Sunday of Easter**

### **From Pastors Desk**



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I am writing this, I am waiting for news on a friend and brother priest who has been in the hospital with Covid-19. Since I heard of my friend's admittance to the hospital, I have been waiting to hear news of his improvement, even texting, hoping for a response, but so far the only news has come through other people.

When I first met Monsignor, I was in my first year as a priest, and he was serving with a friend of mine in Oyster Bay. Getting to know him on a trip to Montauk, and several other dinners, I found him to be lively and humorous, intelligent and, for lack of a better term, holy. Having had experiences with a couple of pastors that were less than stellar, I found myself as his associate on my third assignment and was able to really discover what it meant to be a pastor.

Back in the seminary there was a saying, 'the seminarian you are is the priest you will become', which has various amounts of truth in it. Part of this is based on the traditional model of seminary formation, which takes into account the personality of a seminarian, who would have been young and developing in the traditional model, as well as the example of various faculty. For those of us considered mature vocations, there were many good examples to be found among the faculty, but much of our personalities were already developed. After ordination, we were all assigned priest mentors, men who would walk along with us as we discovered how we were called to express our priesthood in ministry and in our lives. For the first few years I was blessed with a great example of priesthood, Msgr. Midura, who passed on before I finished my first assignment. Fortunately, there were other priests who I could speak to and seek advice and guidance from over time; seeing me through the turbulence of my second assignment.

Becoming the associate of Msgr. Romualdo Sosing was a blessing for many reasons. There are many pastors who behave as if their associate pastors are their children, and it is up to them to shape them, which is a continuation of the old model of seminary formation. This is not a bad thing, if the pastor is a good priest and good pastor and respects the associate pastor as a priest and person. One of the first blessings with Msgr. Sosing, is that he treated me as a brother priest and offered friendship. He also recognized the experience I brought with me, and worked to find ways to use that experience for the benefit of the parish. Perhaps the greatest example he gave me of what it means to be a pastor, was his living out what it means to be a priest.

When it came to the Sacramental life of the priest, Msgr. Sosing would give himself over to the celebration of the Mass, Reconciliation and the Sacrament of the Sick, recognizing the great gifts handed down to the Church. Instead of engaging in "experimental" liturgical practices, **CONTINUED**

he knew that what the Church celebrates does not need any embellishment or personal interpretation. His extended studies in Rome gave him a wealth of knowledge, which he was generous in giving to those who wanted it. One of his great joys was engaging the students of the parish school and religious education program. As a priest, as the pastor, he exercised authority with humility and discretion, which some took as a sign of weakness, but those who were aware saw in him an *Alter Christus*, that is Another Christ.

My apologies if this sounds more like a eulogy, but like many others who have lost loved ones during this time, or are waiting for that person to come through, this has been a time for me to reflect on what the friendship of this brother priest means to me. We continue to pray for a miracle, but prepare ourselves to say goodbye in the only way we are allowed at this time.

As your pastor, following the example of my friend, I will continue to pray for all of you.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

In Saint John's Gospel this weekend, the Seventh Sunday of Easter, we proclaim that "Jesus raised his eyes to heaven and said, 'Father, the hour has come. Give glory to your son, so that your son may glorify you...'"

In reflecting on this passage, I immediately began to think about our priests in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, who glorify the Father by serving the faithful daily.
