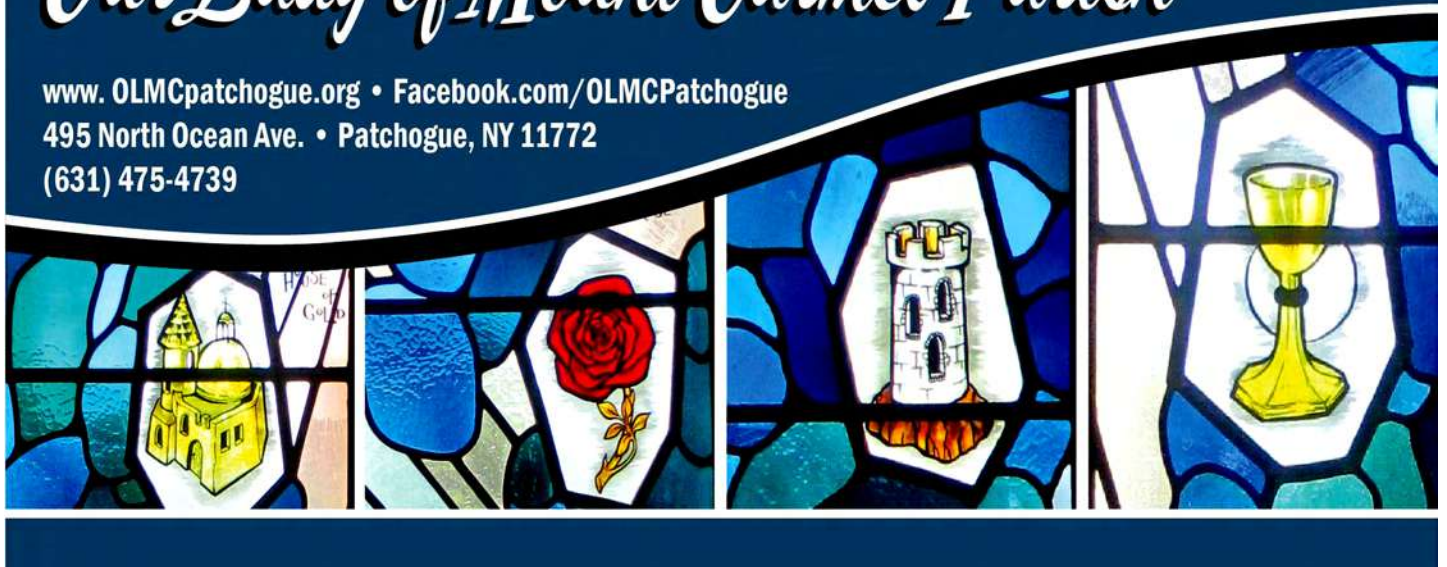

CHANGE OUR LIVES

The letters of Paul to the Thessalonians are among his earliest writings, and are driven by his belief and the belief of the entire early Christian community that the return of Christ was imminent, and that devoting time or attention to anything else was foolish.

As time progressed, this fervor subsided a bit. Today we may wonder, when we hear these readings about the coming end-times, if we should take them to heart, if we really believe that Christ still may come upon us as a "thief at night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2). Does this mean that we are to stop our long-range goal-setting, get rid of our yearly calendars and planners, or stop putting money in the college education fund? Of course not. What it does mean is that we need to change our lives, living like children of the light and illuminating the world around us with the light of the gospel. Then, on that day, when the details of our daily living become unimportant, we will be ready to find our peace and security in Christ Jesus.

Las cartas de Pablo a los tesalonicenses están entre sus primeros escritos movidos por su creencia, y la creencia de la comunidad de la Iglesia joven, de que el retorno de Cristo era inminente, y que dedicar tiempo y atención a otras cosas era tontería.

Con el paso del tiempo este fervor disminuyó un poco. Hoy, cuando escuchamos sobre la llegada del fin de los tiempos, podemos preguntarnos si la tenemos que tomar en serio, si es que realmente creemos que Cristo todavía puede venir por nosotros como "un ladrón en la noche" (1 Tesalonicenses 5:2). ¿Significa esto que debemos ponerle un paro a establecer metas a largo plazo, despojarnos de nuestros calendarios y agendas anuales, dejar de ahorrar para una educación universitaria? Por supuesto que no. Lo que significa es que necesitamos cambiar nuestra vida, vivir como hijos de la luz e ir iluminando el mundo que nos rodea con la luz del Evangelio. Entonces, en aquel día, cuando los detalles de nuestra vida diaria se tornen poco importantes, estaremos listos para encontrar nuestra paz y seguridad en Cristo Jesús.

From the Pastors Desk



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I am writing this column, I am also preparing to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation for 27 of our young people and two adults, who were to be confirmed at Pentecost. Most of you will be reading this after the fact, as the celebration will have taken place on Saturday, November 14th, at 11am, but your prayers for our newly confirmed will be greatly received. Some of you may have caught the wording in the first sentence, when I said I am preparing, and you would not be wrong to think it was a mistake, since it is normally reserved to bishops to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation for young people. Surprise, they made me a bishop.

Just kidding. The Holy Father has more sense than to make me a bishop, besides, I am perfectly happy being a priest. But since the bishops are not making the rounds of parishes because of Covid, we pastors have been instructed to confirm those in our own parishes, after making the proper application to the diocese. So of course I have to review the Sacramental Rite, just to make sure I am doing it properly, and include the necessary changes appropriate to Love in the Time of Cholera, just kidding that's the name of a great book by Gabriel Garcia Marquez; our changes are based on the ever present threat of Covid. In my fourteen years ordained, these have not been my first Confirmations, but most have been for adults at Pentecost. There was one youth Confirmation I was asked to do during my first assignment, and it was memorable.

One of the programs we had at the seminary was prison ministry, where we had to spend a semester visiting the jail in Yaphank, as well as a tour of the Riverhead facility, on Wednesdays. Truth be told, I always hated walking into jails, even though I knew I'd be walking out the same day. After ordination, a Franciscan brother, who was in charge of the diocesan prison ministry, asked me if I would help him out with some of the Masses while the prison chaplain was away. Because of the visitations to the Nassau jail, I soon found myself at the Youth Facility, helping out the pastoral staff there too. One opportunity came when I was to Baptize and Confirm a young man who was due to be transported upstate to serve out a lengthy sentence. Without going into detail, he was convicted for his participation in a murder, and through the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation, his sins were washed away and he was given the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

It may seem shocking to some. The idea that someone who participated in a murder should be forgiven and be rewarded with wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord (awe), may seem unjust or outrageous. In our modern society, which has become extremely polarized, there is either the call that everything is black or white, and those who do evil should be punished, or the other extreme that there really is nothing that is good or evil, and nobody should be punished for anything they do. Our reality is that there is good and evil in the world, and murder is wrong, and participation in murder is wrong, and those who do wrong should be punished. But as Christians, we also believe in redemption, mercy, and the forgiveness of sins, and that Divine Justice is far greater than human justice. That is something those who do evil in this world, even if it is legal, will someday face the judgement seat of Christ, and receive Divine Justice.

But that boy, someone going away for a number of years, for participation in a crime he wasn't fully aware of (that was what the jury decided, not me), could really use that gift of Grace, that opportunity to be forgiven of his sins, to be born again into a new life in Christ, and to have the hope of eternal life held out to him. What he does with that gift, or rather those gifts, is up to him, as it is up to all of the young men and women, and the adults, who receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, as it has been up to each of us who received the Sacrament. But what we do, is continue to pray for our brothers and sisters who receive these Sacraments, that God will strengthen them, and let those gifts develop into the Fruits of the Holy Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control). We also pray that they will continue to develop in all of us.

With the holidays approaching, get a head start by making your own wrapping paper this year. Use your talents and/or show your talents on the wrapping paper.

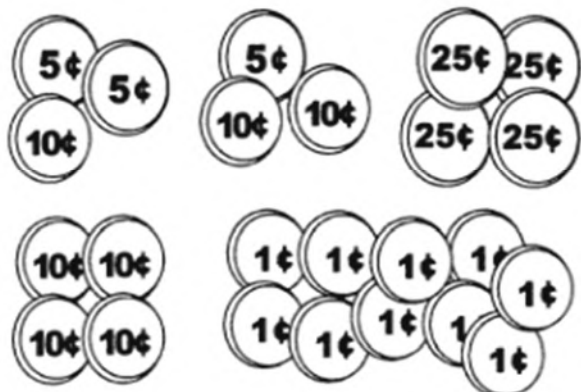
1. Suggested materials are brown paper bags that you have cut open, markers, crayons, ink pads, rubber stamps of any kind, and Christmas cookie cutters.
