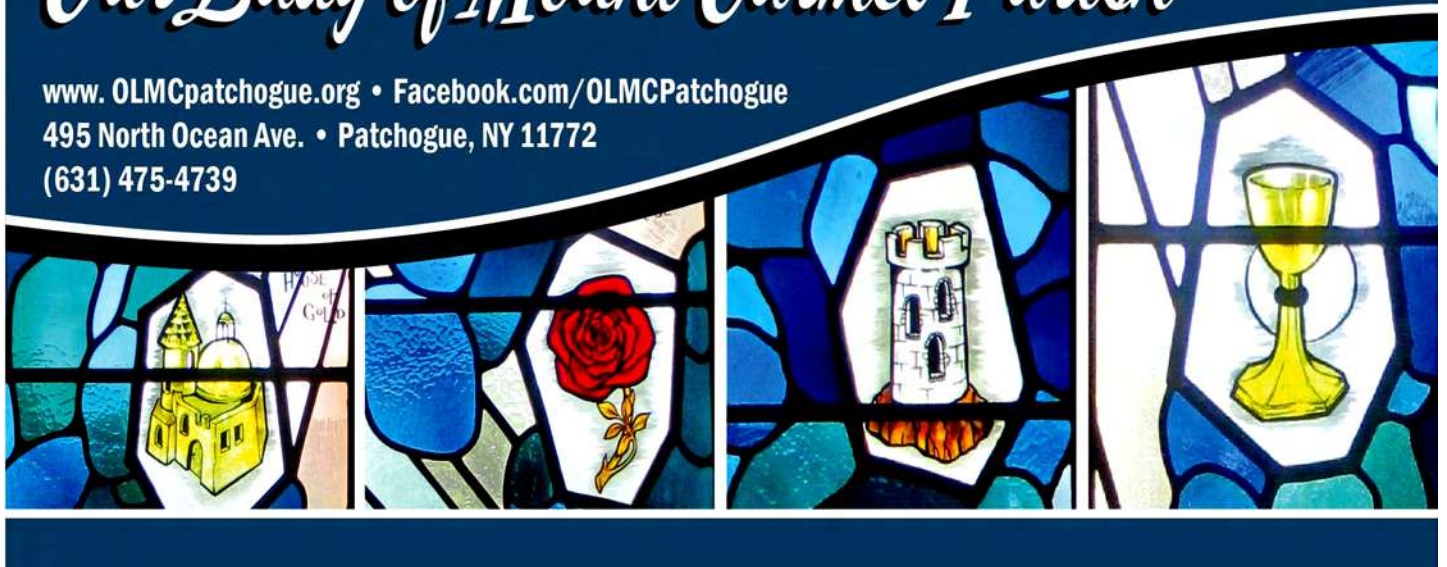

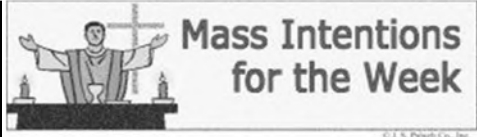

GOD'S DELAY

In times of great difficulties scoffers taunt us, "Where is God? Why hasn't your Lord come to save you now?"

And we of faith respond much in the same way as Peter did in today's second reading: the "delay" of the Lord's second coming is not any type of punishment or failure to keep the divine promise, but a loving sign of God's patience. God is giving *everyone* the chance to seek repentance.

God does not make life more difficult. Rather, God lessens our burdens as once before for the Jewish exiles returning home to Judea after captivity in Babylon. It was God who personally led them, making a "straight highway" for them across the desert.

We join with our ancestors of faith, who hoped that they might see God's Chosen One before them and who eventually realized that the Lord was also walking with them side by side.

FEAST OF FAITH

Watching for Christ's Coming

In the season of Advent, we look to the coming of Christ at the end of time, and we prepare ourselves to celebrate his first coming among us at Christmas. Remembrance of the past is combined with preparation for the future. Memory meets action.

In a certain sense, the Mass is an Advent prayer. At the Last Supper, Jesus did not tell his disciples, "Never forget what I did for you." Instead, he said, "Do this in remembrance of me." He calls us to remember by *doing*, to combine memory with action. In the celebration of the Eucharist, remembering and doing become one. Jesus is as present in our midst as he was in that upper room, breaking the bread and sharing the cup; but it is a new kind of presence, seen only with the eyes of faith. In the heavenly liturgy, there will be no need of sacraments, for there, "celebration is wholly communion and feast" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1136). Here, things are different. We have only glimpses and flashes of the beauty that is yet to be. And yet, in the liturgy, we truly participate in the heavenly liturgy. The Mass is our foretaste of the joys of heaven.

El saludo litúrgico

Uno de los grandes aportes del Concilio Vaticano II fue el reconocimiento de la presencia de Cristo no sólo en las especies eucarísticas del pan y el vino consagrados, sino también, en la asamblea de creyentes. Esta afirmación crea ya un cambio de enfoque y de actitud hacia quien por cuatro siglos había sido espectadora en la celebración litúrgica. Hubo un gran cambio, no sólo de la contemplación del misterio a la celebración gozosa del mismo misterio, sino en el pensamiento mismo de la Iglesia respecto a sí misma como pueblo de Dios y no sólo como orden jerárquico. Por tal razón, el presbítero, quien preside nuestra liturgia y celebra con todos nosotros, nos saluda con "El Señor esté con ustedes". Este es un saludo litúrgico que lleva en sí mismo un gran peso teológico: Él reconoce en el pueblo de Dios la presencia de Cristo y saluda esa presencia. La reconoce. La honra. El pueblo mismo, en respuesta, reafirmando la presencia de Cristo en él, responde: "Y con tu espíritu". Es decir, también en ti está Cristo presente y saludamos esa presencia en tu ministerio sacerdotal, así como tú saludas y celebras esa presencia en nosotros, la Iglesia, pueblo de Dios.

From the Pastors Desk



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

A week ago, as I was getting ready to celebrate Mass, the last Mass in Ordinary Time, and therefore the final Mass of the liturgical year, I looked in the Ordo (the book that tells us what readings to use, etc...) and printed at the bottom was: "THE END OF THE YEAR OF GRACE 2020". When I read it, my first reaction was to laugh; to think that this past year was designated as the Year of Grace. With all of the problems that we have had, specifically the Covid virus which brought the world to a halt and killed off so many people. Within the community, a number of people passed away, as a parish we lost one of our most popular ushers to the virus, and I lost a friend and brother priest. At first, the absurdity of this being declared the Year of Grace was laughable, then it was sad, but then I recalled the great novel *Diary of a Country Priest*, by Georges Bernanos.

In this novel, the priest assigned to a rural parish in France, suffers some of the greatest setbacks to his ministry, yet faces them all with a trust in God's providence. Without getting into the whole book, which is an excellent read for the holidays, there is the wonderful line that the priest gives us through his suffering, "All is Grace."

We may find it difficult to see that every moment of our lives is touched by the Grace of God, especially in times of sorrow and suffering, in times when the divisions and tensions seem to rule the day, and when darkness seems to choke out the light, but in those times most of all, we are called to see light, and hope, and Grace. Part of the problem is that we have fallen away from an understanding of what "Grace" is, where in the past it was presented to us as something that we depended upon and recognized as freely given by God Himself.

Even though there are other uses for the word, Webster gives us, as the first three: unmerited divine assistance given to humans for their regeneration or sanctification; a virtue coming from God; a state of sanctification enjoyed through divine assistance. We as Catholics recognize that Grace is a gratuitous act of God, that is something freely flowing from God Himself, into our lives, to strengthen, to bring about the redeeming effects of Christ's sacrifice on the Cross, to make His presence known to us. And so we recognize that in Charlie our usher, and Msgr. Rom, my former pastor and my friend, we have two intercessors at the Throne of God, praying for us. In the time of lockdown and restrictions, we have had the opportunities to spend time with loved ones, spend time in prayer, spend time contemplating our lives and where we want them to go. In our economic struggles, we have tried to find new ways of doing things, maybe even old ways of doing things, and the opportunity to reach out to our brothers and sisters in charity, and maybe even allow someone to help us.

Grace continues to flow around us, and in this Season of Advent, this season of Hope and Expectation, we see the Grace that continues to pour out into our lives, as we wait for the coming of Christ, Who is the Presence of God in our world.

Background Screening Update

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People:

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People (The Charter) promulgated by the Bishops of the United States in 2002 outlines specific practices and guidelines providing standards of safety in parishes and dioceses throughout the United States. As directed in The Charter, the Diocese of Rockville Centre requires all employees, clergy, and volunteers to complete three requirements within thirty days of employment or volunteering:

Attend **Protecting God's Children Program (Virtus)**

Sign the Codes of Conduct;

Complete a background screen application. The Diocese requires all those who remain in active ministry be rescreened at 5 yr. intervals. volunteers/employees.

A Word on Background Screening of Volunteers:

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OFPCYP) has streamlined the volunteer application process enabling volunteers to complete the three safe environment requirements in one step. Individuals wishing to volunteer in a parish or school:

Register to attend a Protecting God's Children class and create a Virtus account on the Virtus website:

www.Virtus.org

Electronically acknowledge the Diocesan Code of Conduct- provided during the Virtus registration process.

Follow the instructions to complete the Sterling Volunteers background screening application background offered during the Virtus registration process.

Active Volunteers:

If you are active in a parish ministry, have already attended Virtus and have been background screened you may be at – or beyond- the **5yr. rescreening requirement**. If this is the case, you will receive an email from **Sterling Volunteers** asking you to complete the background screening application on-line. You may access the background screening application by following the prompt in the email or logging into your Virtus account. ***Please be aware-this is not a scam nor has your e-mail been hacked.*** The OFPCYP has been working with your parish to update the Safe Environment records and noted it is time for you to be re-screened. You may also be prompted to electronically resign the Code of Conduct when you log into your Virtus account.

Edit Your Virtus Account:

To access your Virtus account: www.Virtus.org You will need your Username and Password. If you need assistance, please contact Virtus: 1-888-847-8870 or helpdesk@virtus.org. Once in your account, review your account information-particularly your e-mail address. If your account requires updating, please hit the TOOLBOX tab at the top of the screen. On the left side of your screen in the green column click "Update My Account" You will be able to make the necessary changes-please remember to hit the SAVE button at the bottom of the screen.

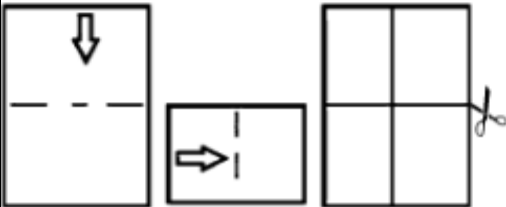
